SAR Process



(Currently Reviewing following recommendations from national SAR review)

Key Stages	Key Activities
> Referral	 Assess whether criteria for SAR potentially met If yes, all agencies involved contacted for relevant information
Scoping	 Case Review Subgroup consider if criteria has been met Where it has, agree methodology for SAR
Commissioning of SAR	 Specification outlining experience and knowledge required for SAR placed on a SAR author procurement portal (Dynamic Purchasing System (DPS)) Author appointed Agree ToRs with Case Review Subgroup
Production of SAR by Author	 Panel members established Author meets with person/family/Carer/Supporter Learning events held with involved practitioners & direct line managers
Completion and Sign off	 SAR brought to Case Review Subgroup Signed off by WSAB Agree whether it can be published
Publishing	 Learning Brief produced (author and LDP&C) Family informed of decision Learning Brief and SAR published on website (where agreed) Annual Learning event held (on themes from SARs)
MAAPs and SAAPs	 Case Review Subgroup contact relevant subgroup/organisation informing them of recommendations they need to address requesting response Action undertaken and once completed feedback to Case Review Subgroup Once all completed signed off by WSAB

Summary of Recommendations



Reoccurring themes:

- Self Neglect (Most)
- Role of Lead Professional (multi-agency joined up work)
- Implementation of Mental Capacity Act (Most)
- Transition

Best Interest Decisions (Lucy/Mary)

Pathways with Children's Partnership (JKL)

Carers assessments and Signposting support organisations (Jane/Lucy/JKL)

Other areas

- Promote parity of esteem between mental health and physical health (Jane)
- Utilisation of advocacy (Mr and Mrs Jones)
- Think the Unthinkable (Mary)

MSP



- Self Neglect is a factor in a number of referrals resulting in the need for difficult conversations.
 - Engagement of those who decline support difficult
 - Alcohol (2 reviews)
 - Isolation understanding how and why this may be (RN / Jane)

Time is needed to develop trust and engagement

research on self-neglect emphasises the importance of building relationships in enabling people to commit to and engage with the process of change

Above and beyond – workers need agreement to go above and beyond their usual role sometimes in complex situations to meet individual needs (Jane / David)

Advocacy should be considered / utilised where required (Mr and Mrs J/ J,K,L)



Multiagency working /communication

- Need for multi-agency planning and oversight (RN/David / PB / MR & Mrs J)
- Need for a lead practitioner (RN / Neil / Jane / Thematic Review)
- Any agency could have called a Multi-Disciplinary Team Mtg (DK non-SAR / Mr & Mrs J, PB)
- Pathway between agencies is complex and unclear (DH/Jane)
- Transition Pathway needs to improve (2 cases)
- Uncertainty about escalation processes. (RN/David / M)
- Difficulty sustaining tenancies due to self neglect policy & procedures in place but a lead agency is needed to progress this. (Thematic review / DH)





Assessment of capacity when there is reason to doubt (David/Karen/RN)

Mental Capacity needs to be clearly understood to ensure consent is appropriately considered. The ability of the adult's executive decision making must be explored. (Jane).

Ensure assessment of capacity is completed when in doubt (Mr and Mrs J, J,K,L, M and L)

In assessments under the Mental Capacity Act, often the "executive capacity" is insufficiently considered. "...the ability to carry out decisions and intentions, especially in relation to one's own welfare." Preston-Shoot (Jane)
